However, the company had implemented a test and hold policy and no eggs have gone to market since last negative screen in Apr 2019. Biosecurity orders are in place.

The farm, a very small supplier located at Anna Bay, NSW advises that it only distributes eggs in NSW in the Port Stephens area and that eggs are not exported outside NSW. The farm has also advised that 		

they will be conducting a recall. The farm was receiving eggs from other farms in NSW that have previously been identified as SE positive.

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Situation as at 18 April 2019

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- NSW DPI Biosecurity & Food Safety received confirmation on Monday 15 April 2019 that samples and swabs from an additional NSW egg farm and grading facility (Steve's Fresh Farm Eggs) had tested positive for SE. The farm was receiving eggs from other farms in NSW that have previously been identified as SE positive.
- FSANZ 2019/28 – Food recall (Consumer and Trade level) for eggs in NSW from Steve's Fresh Farm Eggs in NSW.
- NSW DPI issued a [press release](#) relating to the recent consumer level recall conducted by Steve's Fresh Farm Eggs.

Situation as at 1:00pm, 20 March 2019

- The NFIRP was formally triggered by the NSW DPI on 19 March 2019 as a result of *Salmonella Enteritidis* (SE) detections on layer farms across two jurisdictions (NSW, Victoria).
- At 1.00pm AEDT on 20 March 2019 an initial teleconference was held under the National Food Incident Response Protocol (NFIRP). A Summary of Actions was circulated.

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- FSANZ 2019/14 – Trade level recall in NSW (and VIC confirmed on 21 March) from cafés, takeaways and restaurants of free range eggs from Ash and Sons in NSW.

Risk to public health and safety:

- The initial (20 March) Draft Emergency Risk Profile was drafted by FSANZ in consultation with NSW DPI and circulated prior to the first teleconference.

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- A revised Draft Emergency Risk Profile was circulated (22 March 2019) following more detailed updates from members of the BFSN.

Response:**Environmental investigation (as of 17 May 2019):**

- NSW DPI continue to coordinate an active response to SE in NSW. This includes targeted sampling and monitoring of egg producers as well as, where appropriate, biosecurity orders restricting activity on affected farms.
- 5 point-source clusters have been investigated by NSW DPI
- The investigation includes tracing the supply of market garden leafy greens and eggs. Common egg supply to implicated retail outlets led to SE being isolated from samples collected from 9 NSW egg farms (from 5 producers).
- On 14 May 2019 NSW DPI confirmed that a ninth farm in NSW (Ash and Sons feeder farm) has tested positive for SE as a result of ongoing surveillance of trace properties. However, the company had implemented a test and hold policy and no eggs have gone to market since last negative screen in Apr 2019. Biosecurity orders are in place.
- 1 Victorian farm is currently under investigation.
- The following factors were identified as likely contributors to the outbreak:
 - Poor cleaning and sanitising
 - The use of raw eggs to make deep fried ice-cream
- NSW DPI Biosecurity and Victorian DHHS are engaged in an ongoing investigation into supply of eggs linked to the outbreak.

Action taken to date:

- The SE cluster was first detected in July 2018 and was initially traced to a farm with 52,000 birds on the outskirts of Sydney in early September 2018. This flock was subsequently destroyed.
- On 7 September 2018, NSW Health and NSW Food Authority issued a public statement regarding their investigation into eggs sold under the brand "Glendenning Farms" as a result of cases of SE being linked to contaminated eggs sold in the Sydney metropolitan region. Eggs sold under this brand were recalled; FSANZ 2018/69.
- In early-mid January 2019, birds on three other farms tested positive for SE (farm sizes of 70,000, 30,000, and 5,000 birds). These flocks were also destroyed.
- On 1 February 2019, NSW Food Authority issued another public health warning urging people to check their kitchens for any eggs that are marked with the identifying stamp BEC or BEC115. The advice was that not all eggs were impacted and that, thanks to mandatory egg stamping required in NSW, the Food Authority was able to isolate the particular batch of eggs.
- The NSW Food Authority had placed a Prohibition Order on the business that produced the eggs earlier in January preventing them from selling eggs while the possible Salmonella contamination was investigated.

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- FSANZ 2018/69 (coordinated 7 September 2018) – Consumer level recall in NSW for eggs from Glendenning Farm eggs in NSW.
